ACTIVITY REPORT

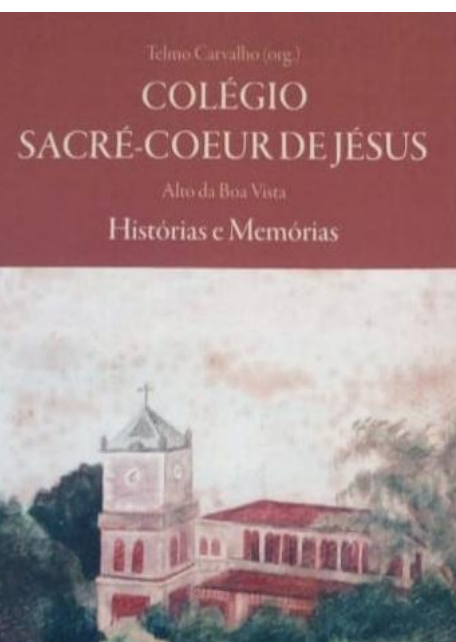
2020/2021/2022

UFASC Report 2022

In 2022, UFASC continued to help elderly sisters and alumnae in difficulty as much as it could, by calling them on the phone or visiting them. It also maintained its financial support to the rscj community in Paris and to the Spiritual Centre of Joigny, which welcomes alumni from all over the world in the birthplace of the Foundress of the Sacred Heart, and made donations to the children of the Philippines and to the small school of Bougoudang in Chad.

UFASC annual lunch



After two years of interruption due to the Covid epidemic, our association was finally able to bring together again nearly a hundred alumni and friends on 28 March for its Friendship Day. A delicious lunch was prepared by the chefs of Châtenay-Malabry, the last Sacred Heart school in the Paris region. This was followed by a lecture on the poet, playwright and diplomat Paul Claudel (1868-1955), given by one of his grandsons, the husband of an alumnus.

Spring outing

Since the opening of the UFASC in 2021, to teachers or members of the schools who have sometimes served the Society of the Sacred Heart for several decades, the UFASC wished that the alumni and their new friends could get to know each other better. This was done during a very successful outing to the Paris region on 16 May, during which the 20 participants were able to exchange ideas and discover together a beautiful work by the famous architect Le Corbusier and visit the house of Zola (1840-1902), one of the most popular French novelists.

On the occasion of our foundress' feast day, nuns, friends and alumnae met on Friday 24 June for a mass in the church of Saint François Xavier, where the hunt of Saint Madeleine-Sophie is located from June 2009. The ANASC-Egypt group is a gathering of alumnae from the two major Sacred Heart schools in Cairo, Heliopolis and Ghamra, who are committed to coming together to serve their schools and community and to support the mission of the Sacred Heart Sisters in Egypt.

In addition to a third school for boys and girls in Abu Korkas, which stops before the last three years of secondary level, the rscjs have also created a centre for mentally handicapped pupils "Ahbab Allah" ("Loved by God") in Cairo, annexed to the school of Heliopolis, they run a dispensary in Samalout, and, in Upper Egypt, they have opened a kindergarden, a home for handicapped children and a centre for the advancement of women in Bayadeya.

Every year, various events and outings are organised by the alumni to create links between them and to raise funds for their charities, mainly related to the rscj but also to support other projects: sick children, Sudanese refugees...

Unfortunately, after two years of total stop of all our activities because of COVID, we could only resume some of our usual activities:

- . The management of the school canteen of Ahbab Allah, our school for handicapped youth which has just reopened.

- . The organisation of stalls with products made by the alumnae during the fairs of our two schools in Cairo for the benefit of some of our works and those which the sisters in Upper Egypt take care of for the sick, widows, orphans and, in general, for the most vulnerable families

- . A facebook page, "Noyau ANASCE" where we exchange news of our schools, of our alumnae or sometimes post applications for vacant positions

- . A choir to celebrate certain events concerning our sisters or the school and even the marriage of an alumna. For example, a few months ago, we led the funeral mass of one of our senior sisters, Sr Brahamcha, at the school.

SCESA Report 2021 - 2022

Post the lockdown period, the SCESA office has been under renovation. The temporary office allotted to SCESA had poor network and SCESA operations were limited in their number and nature. Unfortunately, since December 2021 we have temporarily closed the SCESA office. We hope to resume once our office premises are renovated.

However, despite all the challenges, SCESA continued to persevere as best as it could by connecting new members, continuing with its activities on digital platforms and sending online greetings from time to time.

SCESA OUTREACH

E-Teach Program in Nareshwadi-Dahanu

SCESA has been supporting a rural education project that involves teaching English to students of Grades I to IV of vernacular schools. Since 2018, SCESA sponsors the services of a coordinator who works with schools in the district in the state of Maharashtra. The students at these schools are at a disadvantage because they cannot speak or understand English. The Bombay Community Public Trust [BCPT] was implementing the English E-Teach program in various schools in Mumbai and rural villages of Maharashtra. Ms. Nirupa Bhangar, also a committee member, shortlisted Nareshwadi as the place where SCESA can implement the program.

Even though the pandemic brought the E-Teach activities to a standstill, online classes began in January 2021. In the meantime, BCPT could not continue with the program as their donors withdrew. However, SCESA was keen on continuing with the

The University Alumnae Committee had bravely decided to hold their annual festival once again.

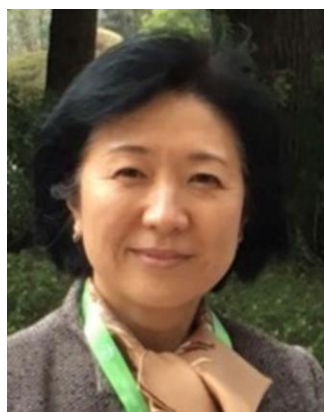

EXASAC-MEXICO Report September 2021- August 2022

At the National level we had activities focused on strengthening ties with the alumni, with the schools and with our religious through different means of communication in response to the new variants of Covid-19 and looking for face-to-face meetings in the different cities.

how united they felt thanks to Mater. Spirituality topics are also shared on social networks.

The nuns invited me to participate in the closing mass of the Special Chapter from Guadalajara in December on behalf of the alumni.

We had a national meeting of presidents and executive teams for Zoom in March 2022, with two main themes: to encourage all the organizations in the different cities to hold face-to-face meetings and the transmission to the alumnae and alumni of the conclusions of the Special Chapter of the rscj and how to prepare ourselves for what the Society is inviting us to do in these times.

With the rscj we maintained and improved the relationship, we participated in the meetings of diffusion of the Special Chapter, we carried out a campaign of diffusion and collection of one of the works of popular education of the religious in Mexico called lyolosiwa.

Efforts have been made to continue united as a community in each of the cities and at the national level and to have better communication with the schools, their activities, and with the religious and their projects in Mexico. The communication of Exasac Nacional through Facebook and Instagram has been constant, with an important number of followers that has grown during the last year. We have shared reflections,

In the field of spirituality, we had a virtual reflection upon Mater last October. This talk was directed by Chelo Armida rscj and was transmitted from Guadalajara by Zoom. Alumnae from Mexico City, Monterrey, Guadalajara, San Luis Potosi, Pueblay and several other cities in and out of Mexico participated. Several of the alumnae commented on



news of the religious, both nationally and globally, of the schools, JPIC, etc.

In the cities where there are still schools, the activities and relationship with them were strengthened with the participation of some joint celebrations, support to families with scholarships or temporary help, improving communication with the directors to coordinate projects and celebrations and the outgoing generations of the schools were received as new members of Exasac.

The social networks of the city teams have greatly supported the dissemination of events and news from each community.

In the cities where there are alumnae groups but no schools, they have met for spiritual growth, fellowship and support in difficult times.

The activities were very limited in order to collect resources for the works of the sisters, alumnae and students with economic needs. The Mutual Aid teams have been very creative in finding funding

mainly through sales of clothing or second hand items or recurring donations.

Opportunities for face-to-face fellowship, such as St. Madeleine Sophie's Day or Sacred Heart Day, have been achieved.

There has been an important search for alumnae who can continue with the work of the teams, but there is little response. There is apathy and little interest in participating. More alumnae and young alumnae are joining for specific activities and in some cases we have supported their projects and they participate in the board of directors.

Both in Monterrey and in San Luis Potosi the "Pilgrim MTA" program was implemented, sharing a picture of the Blessed Mother with the families for a week.

The challenges continue to be finding people who are committed to the association to work for a period of time in a constant manner, the collection of dues and other fundraising programs, and maintaining good communication with the schools, the religious and among the different exasac teams, strengthening the sense of belonging.

UASHA ELECTS A NEW BOARD AT ITS 6TH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING



On July 30, 2022, the Uganda Association of the Sacred Heart Alumnae (UASHA) elected a new Executive Council at its 6th Annual General Assembly (AGM) that was held at the FOCOLARE Community Centre, Kampala, Uganda.

The AGM was attended by thirty-seven (37) members drawn from the Sacred Heart chain of schools in Uganda St Charles Lwanga Kalungu Girls Training Centre, Kangole Girls' Senior Secondary School and Sacred Heart Primary School, Kyamusansala. The Superior, Uganda/Kenya Province, Rev Sr Anna Maria Nankusu, and the

UASHA coordinator, Rev.Sr Noeline Namusisi were in attendance.

The outgoing President of UASHA, Ms. Betty Ogiel explained the purpose of the association and provided a status update of the key accomplishments from the outgoing executive. In her brief, she laid out the achievements of the association in the past four years of their mandate including successful virtual empowerment talks

due to covid pandemic that hindered physical interactions. The first talk was held on 23rd of May 2020 and it was convened to provide emotional support and coping techniques to members during the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic. The period of the pandemic was characterized by lockdown and movement restrictions, and loss of income for some members. The talk encouraged members to start new business ventures and being a support pillar to those that lost loved ones to the pandemic.

During the AGM, Ms.Ogiel highlighted other achievements, including school visits to Kyamusansala on 15th June 2019; KangoleGirls'Ss on 25th June 2022 that were all successful and called upon the incoming executive to uphold them., This is in addition to the different UASHA networking events that were held on 8th September 2018 at Mbuya Convent of the rscjs, and 17th November 2018 at Ggabaconvent to mark the celebration of the feast of St Rose Philippine Duchesne.

Ms. Ogiel, outlined the challenges her executive council faced during their tenure, especially the COVID-19 pandemic that affected most of the planned activities, disrupted livelihoods of

members; slowed members' response to requests and most importantly limited physical interaction and financial resource mobilization which is essential to the success of the association. In her concluding remarks, she appreciated the continued support from RSCJs towards UASHA activities, President Emeritus Hermine for the love and numerous support, Ms. Rosemary Namukasa Ssembajjwe AMASC Africa Regional Coordinator for her coordination role at the region. She also thanked the FOCOLARE Community Centre, Mbuya for providing the AGM venue.

Later on, election of the new team was conducted, and, Dr. Sylvia Namubiru Mukasa was voted unopposed as president of UASHA with other members for next four years. Dr Sylvia thanked the AGM for the vote of confidence towards her and her team, and pledged a servant and inclusive leadership throughout their mandate while growing the association by translating its goals and objectives into meaningful activities.

With support from the RSCJ committee, Dr Sylvia promised that the newly elected executive will continue working closely with AMASC regional and international leadership. She reiterated that

she will work towards consolidating the gains from the previous executives, including mobilizing more members and ensuring relevant activities are implemented to make UASHA vibrant and relevant nationally and internationally, through the Umbrella organization, AMASC.

The Provincial Superior, Sr Anna Maria Nankusu, in her closing remark called upon alumnae to remain united, and uphold the values of the Society of Sacred Heart of Jesus as they offer a service in various spheres of life.

ANASC-TCHAD BRINGS ITS SUPPORT TO SAINT CHARLES LWANGA UNIVERSITY



Created on December 28, 2018 in Sarh in the southern zone, the Saint Charles Lwanga Catholic University, co-founded by ANASC-Chad and alumni of other Catholic institutions, presented its first graduates last September.

On September 22, 2022, 38 students from the first promotion of the Saint Charles Lwanga University obtained their bachelor degree in the following fields: Economic and Management Sciences, Legal and Political Sciences, Mathematics-Physics and Electrical and Computer Engineering.

The objective of this University, which aims to be a pole of excellence for the training of future executives in Central Africa, is to offer a quality university education to young Chadians whose parents cannot afford to send them to foreign universities. This training, based on Catholic values, is open to graduates of all religious denominations.

As an association of the Catholic Education, co-founder of the institution, ANASC-TCHAD actively participates in its activities and is well represented in its various bodies.

However, the logistical and human resources challenges it faces remain enormous. This is what motivated the organisation of a thanksgiving and fundraising mass on 4 June 2022, whose committee was led by Sr Juliette N'Guémta, Rscj and member of ANASC.

This mass, which was presided over by Mgr Goetbé Djitangar, Archbishop of N'Djamena, raised a sum of 9,068,050 CFA francs (about 13,800 Euros). It will help this brand new university to meet its most pressing needs.

This is also the place to make an appeal to all those of good will who want to lend a hand to achieve this initiative of former students from Catholic education in Chad.

This Zoom meeting will share alumni and school news from all four regions in the USA; East, West, Central and South. It will have an educational component that will share news about the rscj Associates groups.

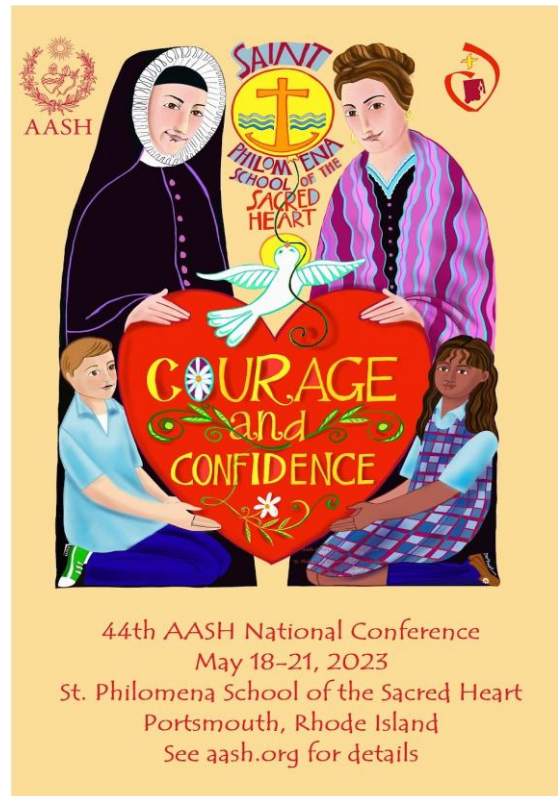
